Many businesses have started, maintained and expanded despite the hard times.

I love my job because we are able to help so many people. Here's some good news by the numbers. Since Jan 1, 2014, Community Futures Lac La Biche has provided:

- 226 Loans totaling \$17.5M
- 155 of these loans were to new local businesses
- 217 Businesses were created, maintained or expanded through our lending
- 289 Jobs created or maintained
- 8 (Only 8) businesses that we have supported during that time did not make it.

There **is** plenty of good happening. Sometimes it just doesn't make the headlines.

Supports for small businesses are available.

While we usually think of large corporations and urban centres as targets for government bailouts during these tough times, we have been fortunate to receive many small business supports, including the *Regional Relief and Recovery Fund* administered by Community Futures. This initiative provided \$560,000 in deferred payment loans to local small businesses that fell through the gaps of CERB and were left out of other supports. On that note: Another round of RRRF funding is on its way to the Lac La Biche Region. Watch for announcements at www.cfllb. com.

Regional projects are being developed to support local Businesses.

Our Community Futures network is working hard to support businesses throughout Northeastern Alberta. One initiative is aimed at anyone selling regional food or agri-food products. Another is an online e-commerce marketplace for local businesses, with one-on-one assistance provided to business owners at a nominal fee. And another project is the further development of a multi-use Mobile App to support rural communities. All of these initiatives will be up and running early in the new year, encouraging shoppers to engage with your business online and in person, ultimately helping to increase revenue and support the bottom-line.

Vaccines are on the horizon.

It may not be tomorrow, but by next year, all of us who want to be vaccinated against Covid-19 should be well looked after.

We have a new appreciation for frontline and healthcare workers.

It's so easy to take the every day things that people do for granted. From the cashier at the grocery store to the truck driver who makes sure we have the essentials we need from one day to the next, to our tireless healthcare workers who save the lives of our loved ones; if Covid-19 has done nothing else, it's brought to light the value of so many people and occupations in our community.

Didja KNOW?



During the 1800s at Hudson's Bay posts like the one that existed in Lac la Biche, New Year's Day included a tribute to the officer in charge. Guns would be fired, people would run up the flag, and that officer was expected to reciprocate. A mixture of brandy milk and various spices – called 'Old Man's Milk' was handed out to everybody who was part of the celebration.

Old Man's Milk Recipe

Beat whites and yolks of six eggs separately. Add sugar and a quart of new milk, or thin sweet cream to the beat yolks. Add to this rum, whiskey, or brandy to taste (about half a pint). Slip in the whipped whites and give the whole a gentle stir up in the china punch-bowl, in which it should be mixed. Flavor with nutmeg and lemon-zest.

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE SURVEYS LOCAL BUSINESSES

The Lac La Biche & District Chamber of Commerce recently conducted an extensive business survey. The survey asked more than 20 questions to businesses in the Lac La Biche Region. Businesses suggested that if the COVID crisis continues for an extended period of time, 62% acknowledged they would require help through Government subsidies and programs in order to remain viable. Here are the biggest challenges that businesses identified in order:

- Reduction in business
- Supply chain issues
- Keeping up with COVID rules (imposed by AHS, Province, Municipal etc.)
- Staffing
- Access to supply of PPE and other safety supplies
- · Getting clear information on available financial programs
- Dealing with banks and creditors

In regards to the possibility of a second lock down, 44% or respondents supported no lock down, 38% supported a targeted lock down, and 18% supported a full lock down. Additional data will be tracked and collected by the Chamber in the coming months. The next survey will take place in February 2021, following the holidays and seasonal spending.

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The Alberta Hemp Alliance Targets Diversification in Agriculture and Industry

As we look to grow Alberta's economy and diversify industry throughout the province, hemp offers multifaceted opportunities including, farming, processing, manufacturing, and real investment and export options to support, grow, and enhance Alberta's economy in the 21st century. The Alberta Hemp Alliance includes membership from industry, municipalities, and economic agencies, acknowledging the potential of this burgeoning sector. Their mandate is to promote the industry, connect and support those directly involved, and educate Albertans about hemp's potential.

The hemp industry in northern Alberta recently moved forward with the arrival of a decorticator this past September, installed at the BioComposites Group facilities in Drayton Valley. This equipment will lead the way for growth in one of the most promising new sectors of the regional economy. Drayton Valley and northern Alberta have all the components to become a

Download the phone App on iTunes or Google Play. Search "Lac La Biche Region." hemp fibre hub, including fibre processing, manufacturing and value added manufacturing. The decorticator operates by removing the outer fibre layers of the hemp stalk from the inner core material so they can be used separately. The outer fibres are referred to as "fibre;" the inner core as "hurd." The decorticator can also carry out some preliminary processing in regards to separation and sizing. The decorticator is capable of processing up to five tons of hemp a day sourced locally from Alberta farmers. The BioComposites Group produces a range of products including, grow mats for short-rotation crops, fibre blankets from agricultural fibres for erosion control and lightweight paneling for the automotive industry.
